FOCUS OF THE WEEK - ENGLISH


Story time in the English Department

"There's always room for a story that can transport people to another place," declared JK Rowling. Just so, and Year 3 and 4 were lucky enough this week to receive a visit from our Director of Drama, Mary Alderson, to mark National Storytelling Week.


Imaginations in Year 4 have also been sparked by the story of Hiccup Horrendous Haddock the Third in 'How to Train your Dragon' by Cressida Cowell. Fun and games in the classroom have included playing Dragon Top Trumps and creating friendly (or fearsome!) dragon character profiles.

Year 3 have explored Shape Poems before having a go at creating their own Calligrams. They are now enjoying planning their own stories based on Michael Foreman's 'I'll take you to Mrs Cole'. Imaginations are running riot as they think of all the naughty things they could be up to at home, and all the scary things that could be awaiting them at 'Mrs Cole's'!













There was also one very special piece written by Tymofii L, in which he shared a first-hand account of his family's experience of the outbreak of war in Ukraine. The class was spellbound as Tymofii recalled (in faultless prose) those first few days nearly a year ago when war broke out, and, in his words: 'My life changed forever'. Having been chosen to captain his school basketball team one day at school, to finding himself in the back of the family car the very next day leaving his home, his friends and his country, Tymofii took us through his experiences.

This helped to underline the importance, value and power of storytelling as it allowed children to wonder, imagine and reflect.



Year 8 have been exploring stories of a different kind. First, in the National Gallery, where pupils stood before the magnificent painting 'The Execution of Lady Jane Grey' by Paul Delaroche, noting the juxtaposition of Lady Jane Grey's snow-white satin petticoat and pale face against the forbidding dark backdrop of the executioner's block.



This set the tone for our trip to the Fortune Theatre, in Covent Garden, where we watched a thrilling performance of 'The Woman in Black', a Gothic horror story based on Susan Hill's novel about the haunting of young solicitor, Arthur Kipps.

Our Year 8 pupils were intrigued to hear that, when the play was first staged, the directors were apparently so short of cash that they could only afford to engage two actors (in addition, of course, to the Woman in Black) to play all the characters in the cast list.

In writing their reviews of the play, Year 8 pupils reflected on the range of tricks deployed in the production, such as lighting, props and special effects. This has enabled them to learn more about stagecraft and to reflect on how a story (and, in particular, a ghost story) can be told to best effect.

In her review, Elsie B (8PW) wrote: 'I thought the set was really intriguing; the fact that it was so simple. It was clever how the different scenes were created with just a few props. There was good contrast between the simple main stage and the detailed nursery behind the semi-transparent curtain and each scene was highlighted with some very atmospheric lighting, I particularly liked the silhouettes.

I thought the actor playing the old Arthur Kipps character was very versatile, chopping and changing between his different roles. The 'actor' character was great at portraying the emotion of the scenes and The Woman in Black was very creepy!

My favourite part of the play was when everybody screamed at the Woman in Black appearing. A particularly spine-tingling moment was when she rocked in her rocking chair at high speed - the sound it made was so scary, but I loved it. Even thinking about it now makes me shiver!

I would definitely go and see this play again if I had the chance. It is such a shame that it is closing soon and no longer able to share its fantastic horrors with other people. I feel incredibly lucky to have seen it.'


Year 4




EVENTS & TRIPS


A week full of adventure
