# TRIP - BLETCHLEY PARK

### Ebenezer and The Enigma - Drama Mixed with History

Last Thursday, Year 7 &8 pupils gathered in the Front Hall ready for their eagerly anticipated two-day residential trip to Stratford-upon-Avon and Bletchley Park.

We arrived at Stratford around midday where the cold, crisp and chilly air hit us as we got out of our over-heated coach. We were very impressed by the broad-paved areas around the theatre and the lovely river walkways.

After a quick break for lunch, we set off for our drama workshops run by Royal Shakespeare Company actors, Sam and Hannah. We enjoyed some fast-paced warm-up games before studying script extracts from 'A Christmas Carol'.

During the production itself, we didn't only learn about the story, we had the chance to discover how Victorians lived, dressed and behaved. We were amazed when the stage opened out at the start of the play, gaining masses of extra space and showing us lots of different acting areas. In Scrooge's office, we could see him behaving arrogantly, being 'sharp as a flint', not showing any mercy towards his clerk Bob Cratchit, and shouting at his nephew and two charity workers.

As well as brilliant acting, there was singing, dancing and lots of superb special effects, although when Scrooge's four-poster bed got stuck up in the air, we realised that even in professional theatres, things go wrong sometimes.

Eventually, we returned to our hostel, which was better on the inside than on the outside. We had nice, warm rooms and the breakfast next morning was incredibly good.

Once we had collected our packed lunches, we climbed back on the coach and set off for Bletchley Park, the top-secret home of the World War Two Codebreakers. The area was enormous, with lots of small huts set around a huge mansion in acres of parkland. Soon we separated into two groups, with some of us taking a tour around the whole area while others went straight into a decoding workshop where we were allowed to touch a real WW2 Enigma machine. We had to work on decoding using signals, signs, numbers and Morse Code. We couldn't believe how the people who worked there could stand the stress of the Morse Code beeps all day long.






# TRIP - BLETCHLEY PARK (CONTINUED)

During WW2 around 9,000 people (mainly women) worked at Bletchley Park which operated twenty-four hours a day. It was a secret mansion, hidden in the countryside between Oxford and Cambridge, so it was less likely to be bombed by enemy planes. Some of us decided that being a motorbike dispatch driver would probably be the best wartime job at Bletchley Park, although others thought they'd prefer to be involved in the code- breaking tasks. Our guide told us that workers were totally forbidden to talk about their work to others from different sections of the organisation, so that if they were caught, people would not be able to tell the enemy much at all. Many people died without ever revealing to their families that they had worked at Bletchley Park.

After visiting the main mansion house and various huts, we went into the Intelligence Factory. Here we saw an interactive map of the whole of the Bletchley Park estate as well as a statue of Alan Turing. He was the famous mathematician who invented the Bombe machine which helped speed up the chances of cracking the Enigma code.

Then the teachers realised we were running late, so we all had to rush back to the coach, missing our chance to visit the gift shop which made us a bit fed-up. However, we soon forgot all about that and settled down for the long ride home. It was a great trip which we all enjoyed!














# LITTLE VINES - SANTA'S WORKSHOP


