#### The Vinehall Conker Season 2022

#### Letting Children be Children

As summer finally gives way to a rather fresh autumnal feel, I am delighted to announce the start of a definite highlight of the school year – the Vinehall Conker Season!

A conker fight brings the child out in all of us and I hope that all parents will join in the spirit, ready the bootlaces and get out and about this weekend with your children in search of some winners! Conker fighting at school during breaktimes will be allowed for a two-week period, though needs to be kept outside please ...

#### Rules of play:

-Two players, each with a conker threaded on a piece of string or a shoelace, take it in turn to hit each other's conker, until there is one conker left.

-The first player holds out their conker at arm's length, hanging down, ready to be hit. The string should be wrapped around his or her hand to stop it being dropped.

-They must hold the conker still as the other player hits it. If it accidentally swings, the second player can steady it before they take a strike.

-The second player then wraps the string of his or her conker around their hand, draws it back and takes aim.

-He or she lets go of the conker as they swing their arm in an arc and tries to hit the other person's conker.

-The first player then has a go at hitting the other player's conker and they take it in turns.

(NOTE: If the player deliberately moves his or her conker while waiting for it be hit, the other player is allowed another go.)

-There is no 'stamping' allowed. If a player drops the string, he/she may pick it back up.

-The fight is over once one of the conkers breaks apart or falls off the string.

## FOCUS OF THE WEEK - MFL

#### **Vinehall Celebrates a Global Outlook**

The 26th September is the European Day of Languages, an event organised across 42 countries. At Vinehall we are very lucky to have many ways to discover other cultures and languages. Our children have opportunities to learn French, Spanish and Latin, to travel abroad and to meet international friends at school.

As part of the celebrations this week, teachers shared information about their own language skills and travels, which prompted some fascinating discussions. Our children show curiosity about the wider world which we are keen to encourage.

Madame Clayton organised a very popular international food tasting for the seniors. As virtual gourmet tourists, the children tasted cheeses from Greece, Italy, France and the Netherlands; meats and types of sausage from Poland, Germany, Spain and Italy; as well as Spanish tortilla, Swedish rye crispbread, Greek olives, Polish gherkins, Spanish pomegranates and French croissants and pains au chocolat. Some brave pupils tried new foods for the first time; others were excited to spot favourite treats.

In Pre-Prep, the Kindergarten children enjoyed a special French-themed day, learning greetings and colours, and finding out about places in France. They tasted croissants and Camembert cheese and coloured their names in the colours of the Tricolore flag – bleu, blanc et rouge.

The European Day of Languages was rounded off with a special quiz at International Club, which became quite competitive. The winning team, "les croissants blancs" (Hannah, Isla and Sonia), managed to score the most points, impressively naming languages, countries and capitals.

## ACADEMIC

#### **Author Tom Palmer, visits Vinehall**

This week best-selling author, Tom Palmer, came to Vinehall and impressed us all with his friendly, down-toearth personality and his stories.

When I first told my form that Tom was coming, one of my Year 6 pupils nearly exploded with excitement! We have over thirty of Tom's books in our library (he has written 57 books in total) and I knew that the children would love to hear what he has to say about reading, writing and books.

I regularly receive emails from parents worried about their children being reluctant readers or who want to know how to inspire them to get stuck into new topics. Tom writes about football, rugby and mystery/detective fiction; he also writes historical fiction so he hits a lot of areas of interest. It was fascinating to hear that he has started to develop an obsession with the Iron Age - I think we will see him going further back in time soon.

Tom spoke to pupils from Years 4-8 about his books, which include "After the War" and his latest novel, "Resist", about a young girl who is part of the anti-Nazi resistance in German-occupied Holland during the Second World War.

Tom spoke about his struggles with reading when he was at school and explained how he grew to love reading through his passion for football. It was fascinating hearing all about how he makes a scrapbook first when he writes a book (which he showed us for "Resist"). As Hattie R (Year 5) put it, he was "very inspiring"!

Tom invited pupils to ask him questions about his work and then signed books for the children, many of whom purchased one or two of his novels at the end. The children asked him thoughtful, incisive and often bold questions. Alessandra K (Year 7) asked him "How many books has your editor said no to?" which made us smile. It was fascinating to hear how hard Tom has to work to make his editor happy, sometimes even changing the title of the book because the editor doesn't like his first choice.

At the end, the children queued up to have their chosen books signed by Tom, with an individual perosnalised message from him in each book.



Margot C (Year 5) declared: "I didn't expect him to have written so many books!"

Arlo K (Year 7) added: "I thought it was cool meeting him because I haven't really met an author before".

Dora G (Year 7) agreed, noting "he didn't make it boring because he asked us interesting questions".

## **MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF PRE-PREP**

By introducing your child to a second language at a young age, you are taking advantage of the critical time when acquiring language skills comes naturally and easily. A child's capacity to pronounce unfamiliar, foreign sounds and to absorb new grammar rules is highly enhanced prior to age six. It also gives children a chance of greater fluency and access to countless professional opportunities later on. Spanish is the second most-spoken language in the world, spoken by 387 million people. Both English and Spanish share roots in Latin but more people speak Spanish than English, and the opportunities for Spanish speakers across the globe are endless!

Thus, we are delighted that we have been able to offer Spanish lessons to our children in Years 1 and 2 this term, delivered by our new native Spanish speaking teacher Daniela Pampin. Although Daniela is our Nursery Teacher, we could not afford to neglect the opportunity of enabling her to teach Spanish to the children in Pre-Prep. This afternoon the chanting of "Uno, dos, tres, cuatro, cinco, seis, siete, ocho, nueve, diez" rang out loud and clear as the children in Year 2 warmed up for their third Spanish lesson of the term.
