

## FOCUS OF THE WEEK – SCIENCE



The Science Department kick-started British Science Week celebrations with an exciting, yet windy visit to Rye Harbour Nature Reserve. This year's theme is connections and pupils in 5L enjoyed a walking tour of the reserve, exploring a variety of different habitats along the way. The children managed to fill up their buckets with seaweed specimens quite quickly and used identification keys to determine different species. It was a wonderful opportunity for the children to learn about local nature reserves and their importance in protecting endangered species. Year 5 are moving on from learning about the life cycle of humans and animals to a more in-depth study of different habitats and animal adaptations after Easter, so this trip has been a timely springboard into our new topic.



The following day, all pupils from Years 2 to 8 enjoyed a STEM afternoon, working together in mixed year groups within each house. Competitive spirits were high, and the buzz of excited chatter filled the room as the children were challenged to build a marble run using only card, masking tape and a chair. The criteria for a successful build included a height of one meter incorporated into the design and a marble jump! Creations materialised quickly and the best marble runs were the few with twists and turns, using all parts of the chair. The most impressive groups were those who worked collaboratively throughout; thinking like engineers to check their marble run worked and tweaking their designs as necessary.



## FOCUS OF THE WEEK – SCIENCE



The children in Year 6 STEM have been creating research posters on a variety of topics relating to 'connections' and I have been impressed by the plethora of ideas submitted so far. These include research on neuron connections in the brain; the idea of how humans are connected to nature through plants; and an interesting look at genetics and how humans are connected through their DNA. I am looking forward to selecting the top five posters in Year 6 to enter this year's British Science Week poster competition. In Science lessons, the children have been learning about the human body and how the different systems work together to make an organism.

We continue to make rapid progress through the syllabus in Year 7 Science lessons, focusing on the chemical reactions topic most recently. The children kept coming up to the lab to check on their rusting nails experiment and made themselves jump with the squeaky pop test, where they tested hydrogen gas with a lit splint. We will continue the hands-on excitement in the summer term when I am looking forward to the children experimenting with dancing slime on a speaker, as part of our Sound topic. The Year 8 pupils are continuing to work hard towards their upcoming CE examinations, but we have managed to squeeze in some interesting demonstrations of fuel efficiency and exploding icing sugar!

## Tam Lin

On Tuesday evening the Chaplin Theatre was transformed into a magical forest teeming with malevolent fairies, heroic knights, local yokels, noble Lords and brave beautiful Ladies in the Year 3&4 production of 'Tam Lin' by Lin Marsh. This traditional Celtic tale was a departure from our usual Lent musicals, but one filled with lovely songs and a wealth of challenging characters. Our Juniors worked tirelessly all term to learn the songs, master the dances and interpret the text and we were enormously proud of them all.



Guillaume BL was the gallant and dashing Tam Lin, bewitched by the evil Queen Mab (a wonderfully feisty performance by Rosa A) and her two cackling fairies played by Alexandra C and Betsy S with great aplomb. Esme L was charming as Janet, the only girl brave enough to break the spell, overcome the enchanted creatures keeping our hero in thrall and win his heart in the process. Teddy H was marvellous as Janet's noble Father and Rex L was a commandingly wise old Knight. There were lovely scenes with Janet's playful friends in Ivy G, Alice C and Indira H. George B, Harry M, Lucas M, Sam L and Arthur P had the fun of the Harvester scenes, rehearsing their hopeless and chaotic production of 'Pyramus and Thisbe' much in the manner of Shakespeare's mechanicals.

Year 3 were extremely busy providing the enchanted forest and wielding the shadow puppets, creatures essential to the lifting of the spell that had kept Tam Lin in the Fairies' malevolent power. Keeping those branches up and trunks still was a huge challenge but it looked spectacular.

Sue Glossop has worked tirelessly to teach the children some difficult songs and many of the Year 4 cast opted for solos or played instruments. This is tremendously brave for such young children and showed off their talents very effectively. We were delighted to have Colin Hughes, our excellent peripatetic piano teacher, accompany the action.

The wonderfully magical setting was created by Head of Art, Tracey Konyu, then titivated with a lot of twinkling fairy lights and ivy. All this, the props and the beautiful costumes were coordinated by the ever-brilliant and creative Kate Hunt, supported by a dedicated group of Year 3&4 parents. As always my appreciation of, and gratitude to, Kate is boundless and heartfelt.

It was wonderful to see the children's confidence and skill blossom as rehearsals progressed. Earlier in the term I wrote about the importance of drama. An experience such as this is proof enough of the many valuable opportunities provided through working as a group, overcoming difficulties, trying to support one's peers and learning that it is a huge amount of work to produce something worthy of public performance. There can be no doubt that our children rose to the challenge and each one of them shone like a little magical fairy light.

## Macbeth

After a busy term of excellent weekly workshops focussing on the breadth of this wonderful story, the beauty of the language, the numerous themes and rich characters through tableaux, soundscapes, improvisation, voice work and mime, the two Year 8 classes joined forces to produce a short performance of Macbeth in a special assembly this week.

The devised script featured excerpts of the original Early Modern English and some current paraphrasing and incorporated all the activities they had completed. I was very proud of all the children coping so well and imaginatively with this demanding but wonderful text; I was particularly amazed by the way our overseas pupils grappled so bravely with language that our home-grown children find a challenge. For me it was an opportunity to reinforce the idea that studying these plays is very important, but Shakespeare intended them to be performed and watched. For our young audience, this may have been their first introduction to the great Bard and the Year 8s did him proud.


# HORTICULTURE

# LITTLE VINES NURSERY



Happy Easter everyone.






## Kindergarten


# RECEPTION






## YEAR 2
