

FOCUS OF THE WEEK - STEM



The children in Year 5 and 6 have been busy in STEM this year, working towards their Superstar CREST Awards. Upon successful completion, the children will be awarded certificates of their achievement near the end of the Summer Term.

Some of these challenges have so far included coding Lego mazes, bridge building using paper straws, building models to tell the story of women in STEM and the successful marble run afternoon which was held at the end of the Lent term.

We have been lucky with the weather early this week, as 5L ventured out for a bug hunt nature walk. We stopped at different locations in the school grounds to collect specimens using specialist equipment called pooters. Using identification keys, the children were quick to identify woodlice, ants, worms and beetles. We compared the coverage of different flowers by the fallen oak tree to those in the woods and the children were delighted to see the bluebells out in full bloom.







FOCUS OF THE WEEK - STEM

Year 6 have built their own egg containers and set up ziplines in the grounds, with teams competing to transport an egg the furthest distance without breaking.

Later in the term, the children will be building water rockets using recycled materials and launching them from different "launch pads" in the grounds. We will also explore the fishing lake habitat on site, where the children can experience pond dipping. There is lots to look forward to in the Summer Term!

YEAR 3

What does a plant need to grow healthy and strong?

In Science Year 3 set up an investigation which will run until half-term. In pairs they planted three bean seedlings for each of six requirements: none, some and plenty of water, air, soil, space, light and heat. They had to decide how to run their investigation and will be measuring and recording the heights of their seedlings twice a week.

'What do you think this might have been used for?'


'Having spent time discussing 'What, Why, Who, How questions' about items on loan to us from Bexhill Museum, the children turned into hunter-gatherers.

Miss E did a great job of hiding the 'plants' and it took 3E some time and teamwork to discover all twelve pictures and several herbs!





Kate O'Hearn untaps pupils' creativity

This week, the Prep School had a visit from the effervescent author Kate O'Hearn, who writes fantasy children's literature (including the Pegasus series). She arrived at the Theatre resplendent in white Grecian robes and liberally adorned with golden necklaces.

An enthusiastic, honest and expressive speaker, Kate started the session, (somewhat unconventionally) by inviting pupils to ask her questions, which led to her telling us the story of how she became a writer.

Kate also, using volunteers from the audience, explained how a book comes into existence, going through a metaphorical conveyor belt of editor, publisher, publicist, printing press and so on, all the way through to the shelves of Waterstones (or another bookstore).

This really brought the process to life for the children and was very entertaining - Henry C (7N) playing the part of 'Rebecca, the publicist' and Charlie C (5L) playing Kate herself, parroting her joyful reaction when her book got published had the audience in fits of laughter.

Kate set the children the challenge of writing a short story, with elements chosen through discussion with the audience.

The children found this very fun. Her kind words and praise boosted the confidence of those courageous enough to read in front of an audience.

Finally, the children had the opportunity to purchase books, signed by the author herself!

All in all, it was a very fun morning and the children left the Theatre buzzing and with renewed confidence in their creative writing abilities.



Kindergarten


It was wonderful to welcome the Kindergarten children back for the summer term and we were all very pleased that we have two new friends joining our class.

We also discussed how nowadays we are fortunate that men and woman can do any job they want to, whereas this was not the case in the 1800s.


