


UPCOMING EVENTS




Creative writing in French

I am very proud of the beautiful written work produced recently in French. Reading and writing a variety of forms has broadened vocabulary and enabled memorable learning.

Year 5 have learned to describe looks and character in French, using third person verb forms with a wide variety of adjectives. They have designed and made "pillar people", each unique and full of personality!






Year 6 French classes have written Haiku poetry in French, on the topic of the seasons.

It was a challenge to invent poetic phrases with the right meanings and, to keep to the accurate meter of a Haiku, we had to identify syllables and count them carefully. The children rose to the challenge wonderfully, with some very creative results as you can read.











Year 7 French have studied "calligramme" poems, which are written in the shape of their content. We studied a famous poem written during the first world war by the poet Apollinaire, and the children were inspired to write their own versions.

We sent a parcel of "mini-livres" off to our pen-pals in France just before Easter, full of photos, drawings and information for our French friends. We are looking forward to meeting them later this term when the French school comes to visit England. Spanish continues to develop strongly across Years 6 and 7 and many children in Year 5 are beginning to consider their choices into Year 6 and are asking good questions about language learning.






Later this term we will be joining the British Film Institute for a Spanish language session about short films.

Also in this busy Summer term comes the highlight of learning French - our Year 7 visit to Normandy. This year we will be in France during activity week. Everyone is looking forward to tasting delicious French food, trying out language skills in real situations and visiting so many fascinating cultural and historic places.

We are going to Mont St Michel, to see the Bayeux tapestry, and many important sites connected with the Norman conquest in 1066 and the D-day landings in 1944.

The Classics department is having a busy start to the Summer Term.

The Year 8 class have been working hard, refining their knowledge of Latin tenses before starting practice papers next week for their Common Entrance exams after half term.

In Year 7 the class have been practising Latin adjectival agreement. It can be tricky at first but Countdown-style games and Latin Bingo help us learn!

At the end of Year 5, pupils choose between studying Latin or Spanish.



The Year 6 Latin class are enthusiastic classicists and love to conjugate verbs – with accompanying sign language!

They have just started a study of Roman gladiators and were interested to learn that the gladiators had themes. For example, the Murmillo was a marine-themed gladiator who wore a fish-shaped helmet and fought the Retiarius who had a trident and fishing net. The class are working on creating their own gladiators and are busy inventing Latin-style names!

This week we have been learning about our forthcoming Coronation celebrations and the children used their amazing language skills to describe our new King; just a few examples below:


"He will wear a gold crown; red is everywhere."

BOARDING




