

RECEPTION



Well done Year 1 on such a productive week!






PRE-PREP

FIVES EXPLORE THE DELIGHTS OF SCOTNEY CASTLE






Last Thursday, Year 5 set off to Scotney Castle to explore the house and old castle ruins, set in gorgeous grounds ablaze with colourful azaleas and rhododendrons. This was a joint English/Art trip which involved sketching the ruins of Scotney Castle and gathering inspiration for our creative writing (connected with our Fairy Tales unit of work).

We found out about the concept of "the picturesque" from Tracey Konyu, who explained that Scotney House (which was built around 1837) was designed to showcase the view of the ancient castle ruins below. Working 'en plein air', we enjoyed a balmy summer's afternoon sketching at a stunning location and capturing some vistas of Scotney Castle. Some sensitive drawings were produced of a beautiful setting.

In our English lessons since our trip, we have been reflecting on and writing up accounts of our visit. Other highlights of our trip included exploring the inside of Scotney House, admiring the artwork in (and views from) Betty Hussey's bedroom and bathroom, marvelling at the grandeur of all the rooms in the house, peeping into the 1950s-style kitchen (as it would have been in Betty's day) and savouring some delicious ice creams at the end of the day!

YEAR 5 TRIP ART & ENGLISH TRIP TO SCOTNEY CASTLE



Last week, we went on a trip to Scotney Castle with Mrs Platt and Mrs Konyu because we are learning about the picturesque in art and fairy tales in English. When we first arrived at Scotney, we went to an education room to drop our stuff and plan what we were going to do first.

We decided to go and explore the Castle and the House. The house was fascinating because it was full of old and interesting antiques. And there were a couple of picturesque viewpoints from inside the old but beautiful house. There were also lots of cat pictures, antiques and more because of the last owner's wife (Betty Hussey).

The first owner of Scotney Castle was Lambert de Scoteni in 1137. In 1778 the Hussey family bought Scotney and in 1830 Edward Hussey called in architect Anthony Salvin to create a new Victorian mansion at the top of the hill, looking out across the valley towards the riverside ruins. Using the 14th century moated castle as the focal point, Edward Hussey planned the garden and the landscape in the 1830s in the picturesque style.

I really enjoyed this trip because of all the sketching, the interesting antiques, the beautiful Castle, the view, the house and the ice cream we got at the end as a reward for getting three positive comments from other people at the Castle. I would highly recommend this trip to Scotney Castle.
