

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# **FOCUS FOR THE WEEK - MATHEMATICS**



This term has also seen Vinehall host a series of four Royal Institute Maths Masterclasses taking place on Saturday mornings as an enrichment activity for invited Year 8 groups from local schools, ably organised by Paul Borrows. Both Paul and Alison Tripp have led sessions and the two others were led by Royal Institute representatives. In the second session, collaborative teamwork was put to the test to determine mathematically if the shapes of hot air balloons would work – leading, of course, to building them! The focus on problem-solving has fostered excellent results in the recent UK Maths Trust competitions. 

#### DRAGONS AND AN IRON MAN FOUND IN THE CHAPLIN THEATRE



#### **MIRACLES CAN HAPPEN**


In RS the children have been reading about some of the stories in the New Testament, when Christians believe that Jesus performed many miracles.

This week they wrote about what they would like to happen if they could perform their own 'miracle' in our World.




- 'Give money to poor countries';

Year 4 had a wonderful day last Friday. We pond-dipped, bug-hunted, built fires, cooked and generally had a marvellous time.


















#### **PLANTING**
